## **BLACK JUSTICE RESEARCH INSTITUTE**

### **Institutional Constitution and Public Benefit Framework**

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#### **1. PURPOSE**

- and speculative allegation presented as established fact.

#### **3. PUBLIC BENEFIT PRINCIPLES**

The Institute recognises that public-benefit activity should support:

Institutional activity should therefore avoid unsafe escalation practices and support responsible safeguarding standards.
