Evidence Assessment and Analytical Standards Framework

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this framework is to establish the evidence assessment, uncertainty recognition, procedural fairness, analytical restraint, and responsible institutional analysis principles governing the activities of the Black Justice Research Institute (“BJRI”).

The Institute recognises that institutional credibility depends substantially upon evidential discipline, safeguarding awareness, lawful conduct, and careful recognition of evidential uncertainty where appropriate.

2. CORE INSTITUTIONAL PRINCIPLES

The Institute supports:

- evidential discipline,
- uncertainty recognition where appropriate,
- analytical restraint,
- safeguarding awareness,
- procedural fairness,
- lawful conduct,
- and responsible evidence-based institutional analysis.

The Institute rejects:

- ideological absolutism,
- manipulative evidential presentation,
- inflammatory rhetoric,
- coercive institutional behaviour,
- and speculative allegation presented as established fact.

3. EVIDENTIAL DISTINCTIONS

The Institute distinguishes between:

- verified fact,
- allegation,
- disputed claim,
- reported experience,
- hypothesis,
- perception,
- inference,
- and speculation.

Institutional communication and research activity should therefore avoid presenting uncertainty or inference as established certainty without appropriate evidential foundation.

4. UNCERTAINTY RECOGNITION PRINCIPLES

The Institute recognises that:

- incomplete information,
 - disputed evidence,
 - communication breakdown,
 - conflicting accounts,
 - and procedural ambiguity
- may arise within complex institutional and socially sensitive contexts.

The Institute therefore supports careful recognition of uncertainty where appropriate rather than premature certainty claims unsupported by evidence.

5. PROCEDURAL FAIRNESS

Institutional activity associated with the Institute should remain:

- proportionate,
- evidence-based,
- procedurally fair,
- safeguarding-aware,
- and consistent with lawful conduct obligations.

The Institute recognises that procedural fairness is necessary to support institutional legitimacy and public confidence.

6. SAFEGUARDING RESPONSIBILITIES

The Institute recognises safeguarding obligations within:

- governance activity,
- research practices,
- publication activity,
- digital conduct,
- and public communications.

Institutional activity should therefore avoid unsafe escalation practices and support responsible safeguarding standards.

7. RESPONSIBLE ANALYTICAL STANDARDS

The Institute supports:

- careful evidence assessment,
- documentation standards,
- analytical restraint,
- procedural clarity,
- and recognition of evidential limitations where appropriate.

The Institute rejects manipulative framing, inflammatory escalation behaviour, ideological distortion of evidence, and reckless publication practices.

8. PUBLIC TRUST AND INSTITUTIONAL CREDIBILITY

The Institute recognises that institutional credibility depends substantially upon:

- evidential discipline,
- safeguarding seriousness,
- lawful conduct,
- procedural fairness,
- proportionality,
- and responsible institutional behaviour.
