

ANTI-RACISM A DISTRACTION?

Symbol over substance.

Anti-racism can be reduced to visible gestures (statements, branding, training) that signal opposition to white-supremacy, while the material structures of white-supremacy—wealth inequality, housing segregation, policing disparities—remain intact and unchanged.

Individual focus vs system focus.

Anti-racism can center on individual attitudes (“bias,” “privilege”) rather than dismantling the structural systems of white-supremacy that operate through laws, institutions, and economic arrangements at scale.

Institutional capture.

Institutions can adopt anti-racism language and frameworks to present themselves as opposing white-supremacy, while continuing policies and practices that reproduce white-supremacy in hiring, funding, governance, and access.

Endless process, limited outcomes.

Anti-racism can become an ongoing cycle of workshops, committees, and audits that demonstrate engagement with white-supremacy as an issue, but delay or replace concrete actions that would materially disrupt white-supremacy.

Narrow framing of the problem.

Anti-racism can define white-supremacy primarily as prejudice or harmful attitudes, rather than as a system embedded in economic policy, legal frameworks, and institutional power, limiting the scope of effective intervention.

Professionalization and industry effects.

Anti-racism can evolve into a professionalized industry (consultants, training programs) that manages discourse about white-supremacy, sometimes prioritizing ongoing engagement over eliminating the conditions that sustain white-supremacy.

Safe channels for dissent.

Anti-racism can provide structured, institutionally approved ways to discuss white-supremacy that are non-disruptive, channeling dissent into formats that do not threaten existing power relations tied to white-supremacy.

Moral positioning over material change.

Anti-racism can allow individuals and organizations to claim moral opposition to white-supremacy, which can substitute for or delay taking actions that would materially challenge white-supremacy.

Fragmentation of focus

Anti-racism initiatives can fragment attention into localized or individualized efforts, while white-supremacy operates as a broad, interconnected system—making it harder to coordinate large-scale challenges to white-supremacy.

Language without enforcement

Anti-racism can produce new language, policies, or commitments about opposing white-supremacy without enforcement mechanisms, allowing white-supremacy-aligned outcomes to continue under updated terminology.

Depoliticization of struggle

Anti-racism can frame opposition to white-supremacy as education or awareness rather than political struggle, reducing pressure for structural reforms that would directly confront white-supremacy.

Absorption into existing systems

Anti-racism can be absorbed into institutions shaped by white-supremacy, where it is reinterpreted in ways that are compatible with maintaining stability rather than dismantling white-supremacy.

Short-term visibility vs long-term change

Anti-racism can prioritize visible, immediate actions against white-supremacy (campaigns, statements) over long-term structural work required to dismantle white-supremacy, which is slower and less visible.

Metrics that don't reflect structural change

Anti-racism efforts can rely on metrics (training completion, diversity numbers) that show activity against white-supremacy but do not measure whether white-supremacy's underlying structures are actually weakening.

Emotional and cognitive focus

Anti-racism can emphasize feelings, dialogue, and awareness about white-supremacy, which may not translate into redistribution of power or resources that sustain white-supremacy.

Legitimizing minimal compliance

Anti-racism frameworks can set minimal standards for opposing white-supremacy that institutions meet superficially, allowing them to claim progress while leaving deeper structures of white-supremacy intact.
