The Legacy of Bernie Grant

Bernie Grant was a leading advocate for reparatory justice in the United Kingdom. His work helped bring the issue into public and political debate and inspired many campaigners to continue developing the movement.

Why Relaunch ARM?

The international reparations movement has expanded considerably. A renewed ARM can contribute by providing coordination, research, education, technology and practical infrastructure that complements existing organisations.

A Modern Organisation

The proposed ARM combines community participation with digital infrastructure. It seeks to develop publications, conferences, research projects, educational resources and partnerships while supporting practical collaboration.

International Outlook

ARM is intended to work with organisations, researchers and communities across Africa, the Caribbean, Europe, the Americas and other regions where reparatory justice is being explored.

Looking Ahead

The relaunch of ARM is envisioned as the first stage in creating a permanent institution centred on the Bernie Grant Arts Centre and supported by the Reparations Infrastructure Platform.
